SAWs + Habitat for Humanity = A Winning Combination



SAWs shares a special relationship with Habitat for Humanity throughout Indiana and especially in Indianapolis. Both organizations invest in low-income individuals and families to improve their quality of life. Sometimes our missions join as a recipient for a Habitat house is also in need of a ramp. This was the case

recently for two new Habitat homes near the Children's Museum in Indianapolis.

The synergy between the two organizations occurs through the sharing of leadership volunteers. SAWs Project Manager Pete Mohr has been a key link as his recruiting has brought a number of Habitat Tigers (serial volunteers) to SAWs over the years. In one of his recent ramp builds, all 5 of the SAWs team were also Habitat Tigers. In these joint projects, SAWs provides the ramp designs and ground-contact treated wood while Habitat provides funding and volunteers.

The grants for the joint project ramps are from IHCDA in partnership with the Habitat State Service Organization (SSO) to support the concept of Visitability, enabling mobilityimpaired persons

to visit persons in their homes without

undue obstacles. A "Visitable" residence is designed to be accessible to people who use wheelchairs, walkers, or have difficulty with steps. Home design must include a "No-Step Entrance" which must be visitable from the driveway or public way via a Visitable Path. "No Step" means no greater than a one-half inch (½") elevation change unless access is provided using a code-compliant ramp under the Indiana Building Code.

SAWs is grateful for the partnership we continue to enjoy with Habitat and look forward to many more joint projects in the future.

Servents at Work Happenings in the Hubs TERRE HAUTE

The partnership between SAWs and the WILL Center (Wabash Independent Living and Learning Center) began seven years ago when SAWs received a call from a young paraplegic woman in Terre Haute. After reaching out to several other agencies with disappointing results, SAWs Founder Rik Hagarty discovered a willing partner in the WILL Center. As a result, this young woman became the first of many ramp recipients in the area and an ongoing collaboration was

born. To date, the WILL Center has built more than 180 ramps, making the Vigo County area the second most productive area in Indiana.

When SAWs developed a Hub and Spoke model for expansion across the state in 2018, Hagarty approached the WILL Center as the natural partner to lead the effort in the Terre Haute area. As the Hub, they provide a prefabrication area for not only their own county (Vigo), but also the surrounding counties of Clay, Parke, Putnam, Owen and Vermillion. They perform all of the steps in the SAWs rampbuilding process with minimal assistance from SAWs, Inc.

Recently, the WILL Center established a partnership with the Wabash Valley Correctional Facility in Carlisle, IN in which the WILL Center designs the ramps and the correctional

facility receives the lumber and pre-fabricates ramp "kits." Businesses like Duke Energy and Vectren, several churches and organizations such as Rose Hulman Institute, Indiana State University, the Carpenter's Union and United Way all support their efforts.

"Nothing is more fundamental to independent, communitybased living than being able to get into and out of one's own home," said Peter Ciancone, Executive Director of The WILL Center. "SAWs facilitated our effort to free our consumers from those confines. They are partners who approach the need as we do – to make a difference one life at a time, but the effect is much broader. Together, we're working to build stronger, more inclusive communities."

When Ortholndy first heard about SAWs in 2011, they were in the process of developing their own philanthropic concepts. The Ortholndy Foundation was established at a time when SAWs was outgrowing its location in a two-bay garage at Second resputerian Church "We

capacity for growth and decided to give SAWs a push to help it grow into something bigger and broader," said Dr. John Dietz of Ortholndy. That push came in the form of a free warehouse and office space that helped launch SAWs into a sustainable organization.

In SAWs, Ortholndy Foundation found a great opportunity to financially support a mission that is meaningful to them while also providing opportunities for employees to give back to the community. "The SAWs mission statement is terrific and it aligns with our mission," said Dietz. "The evolution of the relationship with SAWs coincided with the growth of the Ortholndy Foundation," he added as he reflected on the beginnings of this seven-year partnership. Ortholndy was looking for opportunities to support the community while also providing employees time off to volunteer and SAWs was a perfect fit. With over 950 employees across all locations, Ortholndy makes a sizeable impact in the community and improves the lives of their employees while doing so. Employees are given the opportunity to donate their time and skills and when they contribute monetarily, Ortholndy Foundation also matches those gifts.


