Generits at Work Happenings in the Hubs



On a cold and blustery day in mid-November of 2014, six men from Fiat Chrysler Automobiles (FCA) converged on Marsha's small trailer home on North Washington Street in Kokomo.

The wind blew, some snow fell, but it was no match for the resolve of these men. They took a pile of lumber and converted it into a ramp which became a gateway to freedom for Marsha. Fingers were numb and noses were runny, but the men fell in love. They fell in love with the feeling they got from watching Marsha come down that ramp and seeing the smile on her face and the tears in her eyes. They fell in love with helping someone who couldn't help themselves.

One of the men told a friend from church about the ramp. That friend called SAWs and said he wanted to help. From that call, Crossroads Community Church joined in the SAWs mission. As the need for ramps in the area became increasingly obvious, the number of volunteers grew. One member of the congregation told a friend that worked with United Way of Howard and Tipton Counties. Soon after, SAWs received a United Way grant to enable us to continue building ramps for those in need.

In a couple of years SAWs was joined by the Crossing School for Business and Entrepreneurship along with the energetic students enrolled there. They prefabricated the ramp parts in one of their classrooms, helped carry the parts to the build site and assembled ramp after ramp. In the past year, Howard County became a Hub for the surrounding counties (Tipton, Clinton, Carroll and Miami). With the donation of warehouse space by David Rayl of Dick Rayl Associates, the Hub now has plenty of space to store materials, prefabricated ramp parts and the tools needed for the effort. Thanks to the generosity of time, talent and treasure of our partners over the course of the past six years, SAWs has built eighty-one ramps in Howard and its surrounding Counties.

The men of FCA's Skilled Trades group continue to build with SAWs. This year they have built four ramps thus far and plan to do as many more as weather allows. Thanks to them and all the other churches, groups and companies from the area, low-income people with disabilities will be able to rejoin their families, neighborhoods and communities. FCA's latest recipient of their efforts, a double amputee named Robin, put it this way: "Now I don't have to look out the window and wish I was outside."

Mike and his wife, Ginger, have been involved in their neighborhood since they moved to Indianapolis in 1984. For them, their involvement has been a way of living their faith. Mike serves on the board of the

West Indy Community Development Corporation and it was through a need in his neighborhood that he first learned of SAWs. When Mike was tasked with finding a way to build a ramp for a senior, he found SAWs online. And after he volunteered on the job site, he was hooked.

Not only does Mike give of his time, he supports SAWs financially.
